DLIDAY HIGHLIGHTS





Construction Update

I've been trying to find a way to simplify the construction project. We really have three phases of construction going on:

- There is the new construction, which is taking place by the gym.
- A second part is the remodeling in the existing Morgan building.
- Phase 3 includes all of the Franklin projects.
- We also have unrelated facility issues involving HVAC and boilers in the existing Morgan building that are being addressed as an unrelated issue.

The new construction is going well. Footings are done in the classroom section and they are currently working on footings in the cafeteria/kitchen area. The block layers will be putting up walls and there will be visible progress over the next two or three weeks. The biggest problems have been the cold weather and the footings are taking longer than anticipated to complete. On the positive side, everything is coordinated between the various contractors as we move forward.

The remodeling of the Morgan existing building will take place primarily this summer. This will include sprinkling the building, replacing a substantial portion of the HVAC system, and putting in new ceilings and some windows.





Phase 3 projects in Franklin include air-conditioning classrooms, bringing the kitchen up to code, and entrance security improvements. The entrance security improvements were completed during Christmas break. Bids are going out on air-conditioning the classrooms and we have a estimate of the costs to bring the kitchen up to code. Our cost estimate bringing the kitchen is higher than previously thought because of state regulations. We will be getting bids on the kitchen and moving forward either this summer or next, as we have until November 2016 to complete these improvements.

A big part of what the public is hearing regarding frustrations with the building project are actually related to our existing HVAC system, which has been giving us problems. The age of the system is the main factor with these problems. There are steam trap that need replacing and return lines that have become plugged with minerals from water over the past 50 to 100 years. The needs of the heating system in the existing building have went from an optional part of the project to a necessity. It makes sense that we do something about our existing HVAC in the existing Morgan building while we have ceiling ripped out to install the sprinkling system and run heating lines to the new construction. This has caused the School Board to expand the project to include more HVAC in the existing building. We are also looking at upgrading our boiler system and adding modern controls to the system, as we currently operate on a pneumatic system, which is outdated by all standards.

Project costs for the new construction that came in higher than projected. Bids to lay block came in \$300,000 over estimates and we received no bids for providing steel or putting up the steel. Both of these areas were rebid and both now have qualified contractors to complete the project. We also plan to rebid the gym roof. A number of project alternatives also came in higher than expected.

As we have moved forward with the project, it has become increasingly clear we need to be aggressive in addressing our HVAC issues in the existing Morgan building. It is logical to complete this work during the construction project while building sprinkling and hot water heat pipes are being run through the existing building. The School Board is planning to use Alternative Facility Bonds, which will allow us to do this all at once. Alternative Facilities Bonding is available for health and safety projects. These projects must total over \$500,000 per site to qualify. The School Board approves this funding. The biggest benefit is that costs are spread out evenly over any number of years. Typically Health and Safety projects create a tax "spike". For instance, if we do \$500,000 in Health and Safety projects (sprinkling, HVAC), the tax impact is \$500,000 the next year. By using Alternative Facilities Bonding, the tax impact is \$25,000 a year if it is spread out over 20 years. The Board plans to use alternative funding to help cover the costs of the expanded HVAC needs. The Alternative Funding needed to cover the project will be about \$1.8 million.

We have saved money at the Franklin site. The Board also needs to look at the extent to which we pave our parking lots and if we can afford to replace all the windows in the existing Morgan building. We were fortunate to receive a low interest rate on the bond funding, and even with the Alternative Funding costs, we will be under the projected tax increase. However, construction costs are considerably higher than expected due to a building boom throughout

Minnesota. If you do a Google search of "construction boom" and "Minnesota", you'll find numerous articles talking about all the projects in the state that are currently underway or planned within the next year.

The School Board is working to fulfill what they brought to the public and to do this in the most economical way possible. They are very focused on giving the district a facility that will meet the needs of students for many years to come. This is their community and school.

Elementary News

"At the end of the day, the most overwhelming key to a child's success is the positive involvement of parents."

Jane D. Hull

We often tell parents that they are the first and most important teacher for their child. Research is now telling us that the level of involvement of parents in a child's education is critical to their success in school. Involvement does not necessarily mean attending meetings or volunteering at school. Involvement means participating in your child's learning process and in their daily lives. Here are some great ideas that I found on the Teachers Take Out Blog. In addition – be on the watch for other opportunities specific to Cedar Mountain. FRED Night is coming up this spring. The Study Island Challenge is a great chance for you to encourage and help with continued learning at home. Students will be logging their reading during the month of February – here is a perfect time to read to or with your child. No matter the age --- your child needs your support and encouragement! What You Can Do as a Parent to Help Your Child be Successful in School

Ask your child how their day was. Ask them open ended questions so their response isn't, "Nothing." For example; the best part of my day was...? In math we did...? The funniest thing that happened was...? I was frustrated when...?

Read to your child. This is beneficial in several ways.

- They improve in listening comprehension.
- They build comprehension and you can ask them questions about their reading; therefore assess their learning.
- They listen to a fluent reader, YOU
- You bond together for unforgettable memories.

Practice at home with your child about what they are learning in class. For example: review math facts in the car, have them help you measure ingredients while cooking, count change, tell the time, or practice spelling words at the dinner table. This helps to get involved with your child and learn about what is going on in school.

Support homework. Always do homework together. When your child does their homework alone, you will not be able to see their study habits or see what they need work on. Don't forget it's their homework, not yours. They need to learn it, not you.

Review progress reports, assessments, or graded work. Be aware of your child's grades, behavior, and progress throughout the school year. Are they understanding the curriculum?

Listen to your child read out loud. This will tell you how they're reading (fluency), what kind of book they're reading, and if they understand what they're reading.

Correct homework before turning it in. Be there to catch mistakes and intercept wrong conceptions. The average child needs to see something at least 9 times to understand and engrave it into their brain. If taught wrong, this increases to 16 times! Yikes!

Routine is key! Children (and adults) love routine. For example: Do homework right after school or after dinner, do the same chores each week at the same time or same day of the week, set a time to go to bed every night and/or eat breakfast right when they get out of bed. When a routine is established, your child will feel at ease and know what's expected of them. A good life skill too!

Involvement makes a huge difference! Thank you for being there for your child.

The fifth grade students have used the mini-iPads this year for various purposes. Most recently, they conducted a web quest of the Southern Colonies. Students logged in through their class wiki, and then followed the provided links to various websites. They kept a travel journal of the stops they made along the way.





Jerry Ackerman Wrap-Up



• Playing near others but not interacting, even when using the same play materials

ASSOCIATIVE PLAY

• Playing in small groups with no definite rules or assigned roles

COOPERATIVE PLAY

 Deciding to work together to complete a building project or pretend play with assigned roles for all of the members of the group
