Did You Know....

Elementary students are doing the Jammin' Minute, a program consists of short exercises during class time that can be done by the student's desks and only take a short period of time. The Jammin' Minute combines physical fitness with academics.

What a great turnout for our Christmas concerts. We need bigger gyms. Thanks to Ms. Nester and Mrs. Eberhart for giving our students an opportunity to shine.

14 Cedar Mountain High School are members of the National Honor Society.

Nine Cedar Mountain FFA members attended the FFA National Convention. At the Convention, Cedar Mountain FFA members received individual and Chapter awards. Cedar Mountain placed 9th in the State of Minnesota and they received the National Chapter Award. Jonathan Tauer and Ryan Carlson received their American Degrees. Jonathan Tauer and Trevor Serbus were also recognized for their state winning proficiency applications, as both received a silver ranking.

33 students took part in the school play, Attack of the Zombies. It got pretty quiet in the auditorium during some of the scary parts. Great job!

The Elementary Farmer's Market raised \$4,031 for student field trips.

The CMC volleyball team took part in the Dig Pink National Breast Cancer Awareness Rally.

The FFA Corn Drive for Camp Courage raised \$2,800.

The "Keys to Success" program in grades 2-5 focuses on reading and math. There are 32 students participating.

American Education Week was celebrated from November 18- 22 with activities planned for students and staff to celebrate education in America.

At the Honor Roll Breakfasts for Middle School and High School students, 74% of students who were eligible came and ate. Staff serves breakfast to students who make the honor roll. 100% of Middle School/High School teachers were involved in planning, cooking, and clean up. This was one of the best attended Honor Roll breakfasts I can remember.

103 students in grades K-5 had perfect attendance in the first quarter, up from 79 for the same time period last year.

At the November Bloodmobile visit, Cedar Mountain students, staff, and community collected 62 units of blood...and the goal was 47 units of blood.

The Yellow Ribbon group is open to students in grades 9-12. The Yellow Ribbon committee is students committed to raising awareness of suicide and mental health issues.

Cedar Mountain Yellow Ribbon students sponsored the Angel Project. The Angel Project provides presents to students of all ages. This year, over 100 gifts were collected.

There are 71 students who are members of FFA this year. This is up from 55 last year.

The music program and FFA sold \$31,380 of merchandise during their fall fundraisers.

Behind the scenes on each of these "Did You Knows" are students and staff members who have worked to make the activity a success. On behalf of Cedar Mountain, I want to thank each of you for your support of our school and students.

Facility Analysis Update

During the past year, we have been looking at the high school facility in Morgan, looking at building needs and various options to address these needs. This began when the State Fire Marshal, during his 3 year inspection, required that the district develop a plan to sprinkle the building. The question was, "do we spend over \$75,000 to sprinkle the 1894 section of the building?" The Board established a Facility Analysis Committee for the purpose of exploring different options. The committee has been deliberately moving forward cautiously, wanting to weigh the pros and cons of every option. There is a sense that the district needs to do something with its Morgan facilities, if not now, very soon.

As part of the process, the school district property was surveyed, the 1894 building inspected by an engineer and architect, and overall facility needs identified in both schools. Options include remodeling the 1894 building, adding additional classroom space to the building, and several other combinations of these options. While the committee members could not always agree on all the options that were presented, as evidenced by the fact they are now on Plan K, they are committed to doing what is best for district students and constituents.


In order to get a better understanding of what community members are thinking about the facility, we have contacted the Southwest Marketing Advisory Center to help with this process. The Southwest Marketing Advisory Center works with students from Southwest Minnesota State University to do independent research and help make sure community voices are heard.

This group has established itself with previous school district analyses in southwest Minnesota as being impartial, fair and to-the-point with their analysis of community perceptions and feelings. They will be holding a series of individual interviews and public forums to gain sufficient input to construct a meaningful survey to be distributed to every registered voter in the district. Based on those responses, the school board will be in a better position to determine future actions concerning the physical facilities in the district.

WEATHER

Here are a few reminders after our abrupt leap into winter last week:

- School closings are sent through the Instant Alert program to those who have signed up for this service. If you have not signed up, or would like to be removed from the program, contact the school.
- Closings are sent to area radio stations and television stations in Minneapolis/St. Paul. See our web site for specific radio and television stations.
- Our buses do their best to reach all students, but if a road does not appear to be passable, we will contact the family rather than risk getting a bus stuck on the road.
- The District respects parental decisions if you would choose to keep your child home until the conditions improve.
- All school activities will not be held when school is closed due to inclement weather.
- All after-school activities will be canceled when school is dismissed early because of inclement weather.
- In case of a late start, breakfast will not be served at school that day.





Elementary News

In January our character education lessons will focus on anti-bullying. The latest research shows that *one in three children are directly involved in bullying as a perpetrator, victim, or both.* But it doesn't have

to be this way. As parents we have the power to help reduce bullying. Here is an excerpt from Education.com's actions you can take to help address bullying:

Talk with and listen to your kids – everyday.

You can encourage your children to buck that trend by engaging in frequent conversations about their social lives. If your children feel comfortable talking to you about their peers before they're involved in a bullying event, they'll be much more likely to get you involved after.

Monitor your child's free time. Research shows that 67% of bullying happens when adults are not present.

Be a good example of kindness and leadership. Your kids learn a lot about power relationships from watching you. When you get angry at a waiter, a sales clerk, another driver on the road, or even your child, you have a great opportunity to model effective communication techniques. Any time you speak to another person in a mean or abusive way,

you're teaching your child that bullying is OK.

Learn the signs. Most children don't tell anyone (especially adults) that they've been bullied. It is therefore important to learn to recognize possible signs of being victimized, such as frequent loss of personal belongings, complaints of headaches or stomachaches, avoiding recess or school activities, and getting to school very late or very early. If you suspect that a child might be being bullied, talk with the child's teacher or find ways to observe his peer interactions to determine whether or not your suspicions might be correct.

Create healthy anti-bullying habits early.

Help develop anti-bullying and anti-victimization habits early in your children—as early as preschool. Coach your children on what not to do—hitting, pushing, teasing, “saying na-na-na-na-na,” or being mean to others. Help your child to focus on how such actions might feel to the child on the receiving end. Remind them to watch their own behavior - that if they have been asked to stop doing a specific behavior that hurts someone – and they continue to do it – that can be viewed as bullying. Listen to how children talk to each other – unwanted nicknames, repeated “just joking around” is possibly hurtful to the child on the receiving end. Equally if not more important, teach your children what to do—kindness, empathy, fair play, and turn-taking are critical skills for good

peer relations. Children also need to learn how to say “no” firmly if they experience or witness bullying behavior. Coach your child about what to do if other kids are mean—get an adult right away, tell the child who is teasing or bullying to “stop,” walk away, ignore the bully and find someone else to play with.

Teach your child about cyberbullying.

Children often do not realize what cyberbullying is. Cyberbullying includes sending mean, rude, vulgar, or threatening messages or images; posting sensitive, private information about another person; pretending to be someone else in order to make that person look bad; and intentionally excluding someone from an online group. There's a simple test you can teach your children about online posting: if you wouldn't say it to someone's face or you would not feel comfortable having your parents see it—don't post it (or take it down now).

Spread the word that bullying should not be a normal part of childhood. Some adults hesitate to act when they observe or hear about bullying because they think of bullying as a typical phase of childhood that must be endured or that it can help children “toughen up.” It is important for all adults to understand that bullying does not have to be a normal part of childhood. Bullying is a serious problem, but if we all work together, it's one we can impact.

Cedar Mountain Elementary celebrated Mix It Up At Lunch Day with a sports theme this year. The event was organized by the Blue Crue Tue. Each year Mix It Up At Lunch Day is recognized as it gives staff and students the opportunity to sit with other adults and classmates they may not otherwise have the opportunity to. The conversation starters at each table help guide the discussions. Much fun was had by all!

MINNESOTA Reading Corps

What is Reading Corps?

Minnesota Reading Corps is a statewide initiative. It was created to help Minnesota students read at grade level by the time they leave the third grade. By doing this, MRC hopes to help more Minnesota students meet future educational goals with success, including high school graduation.



The Reading Corps tutor at Cedar Mountain is Chris Taylor. She meets with 16 selected elementary school students a day. The tutor works with each student with different reading interventions for 20 minutes every day. Sets of interventions are chosen to cater to each child's personal needs. These interventions are chosen by the Reading Corps tutor and her Internal Coach Cedar Mountain Elementary Reading Specialist, Beth Shultz. Once the student has successfully progressed and improved with selected interventions, they are graduated from the program.

So far this school year, Taylor has worked with 24 different students. 8 students have successfully progressed through the Reading Corps program.



Cedar Mountain students in grades 4th-6th had the opportunity to sharpen their volleyball skills through the CM Community Education program led by Coach Deb Distad. with students on a professional level. Connecting with others has been a true strength of Cedar Mountain, and we have many happy people in our hallways, students and staff alike.



Exciting times are ahead at the Middle/High School!




WE WOMEN Empowerment




