gram covers our after school programs offered here at Cedar Mountain. It is a federally funded program that Mrs.Tietz has been the coordinator of for the past few years



Time To Celebrate!

We were so excited to receive the news that **Cedar Mountain Elementary was named a Celebration School!** Some folks have asked me if we get a monetary award ---- or a visit from the Governor ---- or a certificate for the wall! Actually - what we do receive is the pride in knowing that our students, staff, and families have worked hard to make student achievement a priority and it has paid off!

To be eligible to apply for a Celebration School status our school had MMR (Multiple Measurement Rating) scores that placed us in the top 60th to 86th percentile of top performing schools. MMR ratings are based on student proficiency, student growth, and closure of the achievement gap.

More than 140 schools applied for this distinction and 57 were chosen. Brenda Cassellius, Minnesota Education Commissioner, wrote "Your selection is a direct reflection of the gains your school has made and the tireless efforts you and your staff have directed toward improving outcomes for your students."



In the application for the award, I highlighted these initiatives as being positive efforts in improving academic skills: our school wide behavior program, "reading buddies", 21st Century after School Program, Study Island Challenges, Power ½ Hour, and the use of testing data to set personal and class wide goals. The teaching of reading is a priority at our school. Each classroom has 90 minutes of reading instruction daily using our new Language Arts curriculum. Student progress is measured regularly and students receive additional instruction at their level in small groups.

Cassellius commented, "It takes focus and commitment to put systems and strategies in place that yield the kind of results your school has shown. You and your entire team deserve sincere congratulations for this outstanding accomplishment."

We will be celebrating this award with our students this month with special treats and activities! We are proud of our students and staff for this accomplishment!




Minnesota Author Visit














Speed Cup Stackers Are On The Loose!

Students at Cedar Mountain Elementary participated in a Speed Cup Stacking unit recently in physical education class. Speed Cup Stacking is new to the Cedar Mountain P.E. curriculum this year, but it has been around since the late 1990's. Invented in California, Speed Cup Stacking involves stacking 12 plastic cups into different patterns and then down stacking them as quickly as possible. This is a great activity for developing hand-eye coordination, quickness and ambidexterity. Sport stacking helps students develop bilateral proficiency equal performance on both sides of the body. By increasing bilateral proficiency, a student develops a greater percentage of the right side of the brain, which houses awareness, focus, creativity and rhythm. Stacking helps train the brain for sports and other activities where the use of both hands is important. Sequencing and patterning are also elements of sport stacking, which can help with reading and math skills.


5th Grade Science Fair

and questions concerning battery life, electricity, volleyball serves, solar energy, and sled speeds.






KNOWLEDGE BOWL

Mock Trial

The Minnesota High School Mock Trial Program is an exciting law-related education program that introduces students to the American legal system. It provides a challenging opportunity for students to



exercise their critical thinking and teamwork skills as well as learn about the justice system first hand. A team consists of three lawyers and three witnesses who compete against other teams from participating schools. Teams are judged on their presentation rather than who wins the legal merits of the case.

This year's case this was The State of Independence vs. Dustin Beaver. Beaver was a senior who took some of his friends boating following the school prom. Alcohol was consumed before they went tubing on the river. At about the same time, another group of students decided to go swimming. One of them disappeared after Beaver's boat sped by the area. The body was found several days later with injuries consistent with being hit by a boat. Beaver was charged with aggravated manslaughter and death by vehicular homicide.

Cedar Mountain competed three times, winning one trial and losing the other two. Lawyers for the defense were Shawn Sherman, Allison Madsen and Haley Weidman. Acting as witnesses were Brittany Lemcke, Brianna Weinzetl and Nick Malecek. On the prosecution side, trying to convict Beaver, were lawyers Andy Berkey, Brianna Weinzetl and Mary Mace. Witnesses were Nick Malecek, Jordan Kleinschmidt and Jennica Hacker. Sherman, Madsen, Lemcke, Weinzetl and Berkey are all seniors. Gaining valuable experience were freshman Weidman, Malecek, Mace, Kleinschmidt and Hacker.
